From the Convener's Desk

Today, our country is younger than ever before. More than 50 percent of its population is in the working age group of 15 to 29. But, at the same time, it is very unfortunate that a large number of these people are unemployed. Our country has long suffered from the intractable youth unemployment that has been made worse by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Having a significant number of young people out of work can negatively impact a community's economic growth and development. If left unchecked, youth unemployment can have serious social repercussions because unemployed youth tend to feel left out, leading to social exclusion, anxiety, and a lack of hope for the future.

Given that almost 90 percent of all young people are from low-income families, not believing that a better life is possible can result in millions of young people floundering in poverty and frustration. It is no surprise that the lack of decent employment opportunities forces even highly qualified young people to take up self-employment and low-paid contractual jobs with deplorable working conditions.

The problem has become significantly worse over time as the Indian economy has failed to generate adequate employment opportunities outside of agriculture for its rapidly growing young population, which has become increasingly overeducated over time. If left unchecked, the situation is likely to worsen in terms of poverty and crime rate due to labor exploitation, political instability, mental health issues, and skill loss.

The three basic needs of human beings are food, home, and clothing. All these needs can be properly fulfilled if a person has money. And to earn this money, the person must be gainfully employed.

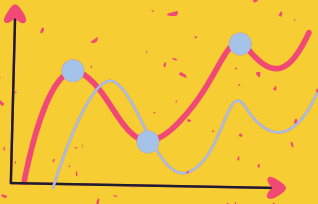
The experience of long-term unemployment has a negative impact on different dimensions of young people's lives. When compared to employed youth, unemployed youth are less satisfied with their lives and are more isolated and less independent financially. Dissatisfaction and frustration among youth, especially educated urban youth, are therefore regarded as the major threat to social and political stability.

We, therefore, need to address the root causes of youth unemployment rather than its symptoms. This needs to be done urgently.

"Meri to Zindagi hi badal gayi " My Life has changed says Bina with twinkling eyes. Beena lives in Sadanand Nagar, an urban slum in Kanpur Nagar district of Uttar Pradesh. She is the member and President of Sadanand Nagar 7 Women Self Help Group promoted by Shramik Bharti.

Beena, a mother of two children; a girl and a boy recalls her journey since 2009 when she first learnt about WSHGs formed in her community by the organization. Her family condition was very poor as her husband was earning just Rs. 1500 from a private job. It was too hard for Bina & her family of 4 to live a dignified life with this meagre income .

After learning about self help groups, Beena knocked each and every house in her vicinity and motivated women to form a group. Her commitment and hard work translated into the formation of a SHG named "Sadanand Nagar 7 Mahila Swayam Sahayata Samooh" in the year 2009.

From here begins the story of change in the life of Beena. " I started saving Rs. 100 per month and took my first loan from SHG for depositing the fee of my son who was then studying in class 6. Since then I've borrowed around Rs. 6-7 lacs from the group, for various causes like the education and marriage of my children, construction of house and recently I've purchased a new plot where I've established a small grocery shop. Joining SHG gave me confidence and I explored other avenues of livelihood to support my family. I started preparing Mangalsootra Doori as a job work and expanded this work among other women in my neighborhood. Today 10-12 women are also doing this work of preparing Mangalsootra Doori and supporting their families with an additional income. We never imagined that small savings and small groups can improve our lives in such a wonderful way" shares Beena blissfully.

Women leading farming innovations

NATURAL FARMING & FPO PROMOTION

It was year 2015, when Women Self Help Group Members of Ekta Mahila Samiti, a SHG Federation in Shivrajpur Block of Kanpur Nagar district in Uttar Pradesh learnt Natural farming and they began with developing Kitchen Gardens, using natural farming processes, in and around their houses. These women were from small and marginal farming families for whom farming had become a loss making occupation as these were engaged in high external input based chemical farming.

From here the safe food journey started!

Soon, many families who developed kitchen gardens, shifted to natural farming practices on their farms and started producing chemical free safe food.

The idea of registering Farmer Producer Organization to strengthen these efforts was floated among the group members and it was well accepted by all.

Ekta Nature Farming Producer Company Limited (ENFPC) was formed in the year 2016 having 42 SHGs comprising 504 women members from small and marginal farming families. Today

An initiative, that spurred with the discussion among small group of women members of SHGs, is now thriving as FPC which has 50 SHGs, comprising 612 farming families as shareholders of ENFPC. There is 500 Acres land under natural farming which act as carbon reservoir. The company owns an Agri processing unit, 5 Storage, Cleaning and Grading facilities that have storage capacity of 75 metric

Waqt Ki Awaaz- Community Radio Station

Started in the year 2013 Waqt Ki Awaaz- Community Radio is providing voices to rural community in Kanpur Dehat district of Uttar Pradesh. Over the years It has been evolved as platform to foster interest and participation of marginalized people.

Waqt Ki Awaaz is uniquely placed in the community. All its Producers, Grameen Reporters, artists and musicians belongs to local community.

This year radio broadcasted programmes on education, social awareness and entertainment in local languages. A glimpse of major programmes include Poshan Ghar, Hinsa ko No, Nazariya, Khet ke khiladi, Meena ki Duniya, Jan Pahal, Mission Corona, Tabiyat Ka Tanabana, Saptrang, Gaon Ki Gathariya, Lotam loat and many more.

A RADIO PROGRAM PROMOTING NUTRITION

Meena is regular listener of Waqt Ki Awaaz, Community Radio. She resides in Anooppur village in Kanpur Dehat district of Uttar Pradesh. She has developed a small kitchen garden in her house. While listening radio she came across to a radio series "Poshan Ghar" that focuses on developing Multilayer Kitchen Garden using natural farming practices to ensure availability of safe, fresh and nutritious vegetables throughout the year for family consumption.

"Poshan Ghar" gave Meena a vision to grow vegetables without using harmful chemical and pesticides in her kitchen garden. She listened each and every episode of the series and followed the processes and practices mentioned in the series for growing vegetables using natural farming.

"We do not need to purchase much vegetables from the market for family consumption. There are fresh and chemical free vegetables available throughout the year in our kitchen garden" tells Meena cheerfully".



Promotion of Renewable Energy

"To truly transform our economy, protect our security, and save our planet from the ravages of climate change, we need to ultimately make clean, renewable energy the profitable kind of energy." —Barack Obama

Shramik Bharti, in partnership with its Group Organization Shramik Bharti Foundation, is engaged in increasing the energy independence and reducing the impacts of global warming by promoting solar energy.

This year, 10 solar water pumps were installed in Lucknow, Unnao, Bhadohi and Chitrakoot districts of Uttar Pradesh.

A 45 Days' residential Training program to equip youths in green skills was organized and it ensured participation of 30 youths; both girls and boys.

The work of electrification of two villages with 100 KW solar systems and 100 cubic meter biogas plant to generate electricity, in Harnu Panchayat in Shivrajpur Block of Kanpur Nagar progressed in partnership with IIT-K, Dakshinanchal Vidhyut Vitran Nigan & Shramik Bharti Foundation.



COVID 19- Second Wave Relief, Rebuilding & Awareness Activities

Shramik Bharti got engaged with COVID Resource Groups comprising voluntary organizations, Responsible citizens, and Techie youths in Lucknow and Kanpur districts of Uttar Pradesh. These platforms helped COVID affected people and their families to get oxygen cylinders, medicine, hospital beds, Plasma, food, access to corona volunteers and various relevant information through use of technology such as whatsapp, Instagram and Google Directory to provide hands on COVID Related information and services

Nudging Food Security

SUPPORTING THE MOST MARGINALIZED WITH DRY RATION KIT DURING COVID 19 PANDEMIC

Sabira, aged 40 years is resident of Kanpur Nagar, Uttar Pradesh. Her husband Akhtar was addicted to injectable drugs and now undergoing rehabilitation therapy with the support of Shramik Bharti under a HIV Prevention program of Uttar Pradesh Aids Control Society (UPSACS). The Drug addiction made Akhtar sick and he is unable to work much. It is Sabira who work as labour to earn bread for the family.

The second wave of COVID 19 affected the livelihood of Sabira like many other marginalized families. There was no work available, thus no income. Sabira and her family were anyhow trying to survive on the wheat and rice provided by government under PDS. Other essential grocery items like oil, pulses, sugar, tea etc. were almost finished and Sabira was left with no cash to purchase the same.

Dry Ration Kit support by Shramik Bharti at those hard hitting time was like a godsend that helped Sabira and her family to survive.



Nudging Food Security

Soni, aged 32 years is residing in Kanpur city, Uttar Pradesh with her husband, two children and her old mother in law. Soni's husband does not work due to some problem in his leg. Soni works as domestic help and earn for the family.

“During second wave of COVID 19, I could not continue my work as housemaid. There was no money left to purchase the essential grocery items for the family of five people. At this time, Shramik Bharti's support in the form of Dry Ration Kit for one month that comprised of basic, grocery items like wheat, rice, pulses, oil, spices, sugar and tea was just great. What else we could have ask for in those tough times” muses Soni.



Shyam (name changed), aged 25 years stays with his parents in Kanpur city, Uttar Pradesh. He is HIV positive. His father has age related illnesses and does not able to work. Both Shyam and her mother works as labour and domestic help respectively, to earn income for their survival.

They lost work during Second wave of COVID 19. Loss of income severely affected the food security of the family. Whereas, Shyam, being suffering from an immuno-deficiency disease, requires good diet, but his family was at the verge of starvation.

The support of dry ration kit for one month helped Shyam and her family to have food on their plates during the most difficult time of theirs.



Shramik Bharti is promoting natural resource based livelihoods among rural communities to reduce their vulnerabilities to various shocks and threats and increase their resilience, by enhancing their skills, capacities and resources

Natural Farming



We are promoting Natural Farming which follows the ideology of “Avartansheelta” (means maintaining water, air, temperature, fertility, energy and societal equilibrium) is the essence of farming. It holds the answer to most of the pressing issues/problems threatening humanity and our ecological sustainability

Presently 1000+farmers are practicing natural farming on 1000 Acres land in Uttar Pradesh and Punjab.

Natural farming has been able to improve natural resource use efficiency and economic opportunities for rural households engaged in agriculture and allied sector by ensuring their participation in Bouquet of activities that finally contributed towards developing Safe Agri Value Chain in Uttar Pradesh.

Training programmes were conducted to skill farmers in natural farming processes and practices. Demonstrations to prepare natural decoctions such as bio fertilizers, pesticides, growth promoters et cetera held.

The farmers were introduced to the concept of co-existence and Avartansheelta for prosperous living which they further adopted in the farming as per their unique needs and situations.

1245 Kitchen Gardens developed using natural farming practices, this year. This ensured the nutritional security of small and marginal farming families by making fresh and safe vegetables available for family consumption, throughout the year.

The additional income earned through sale of surplus vegetables contributed towards livelihood improvement of these families.

Community Seed & Tool Bank



To support farmers in adoption of natural farming, community seed banks and agri tool banks were set up in villages.. At seed banks traditional and local varieties of seeds were stored and conserved for the use by natural farmers, who borrowed seeds from the bank at the time of sowing and returned the seeds by adding 50% to it after harvesting. Thus making seed banks self sustainable.

Small yet efficient agri tools were introduced for reducing the drudgery of small farmers and making the farm operations much easy and efficient. These tools include scythe, potato weeder, Seed drill etc.

6 Cleaning, Grading and Storage Facilities were developed in villages in Kanpur Nagar district in Uttar Pradesh. This supported around 300 small and marginal farming families to store their grains after harvest and to sell it later(during off-season) for better price realization of their produce. The basic processing like cleaning and grading further added value to the agri produce. Thus provided better prices in the market.

Agri Processing Units



There are 2 agri processing units run and managed by their respective Farmer Producer Organizations in Kanpur Nagar (Ekta Nature Farming producer Company Limited) and Fatehpur (Shrashti Nature Farming Producer Company Limited) districts of Uttar Pradesh.

These agri processing units are having facilities of basic processing of wheat, rice, pulses, spices and mustard seeds.

The product range include wheat flour, Daliya, gram flour, millets, pulses, spices mustard oil and pickles.



Earning Livelihood... Adding Nutrition

IMPACT STORY OF MULTILAYER KITCHEN GARDEN

Meet Chandrawati. She lives in Raimalpur village in Bhadohi district, Uttar Pradesh. Chandra has learnt developing multilayer kitchen garden during a training session on natural farming by natural farming expert from Shramik Bharti. She translated her learning into action by developing a kitchen garden on a small piece of land (around 0.08 acre).

"Now my family has enough vegetables for daily consumption. Prior to this when we were not having cash to purchase vegetables we used to have just potatoes, onion and chutney and sometimes pulses on our plate with roti or rice." recalled Chandrawati. She further added that the vegetables are fresh, safe and tasty as these are grown without using harmful chemicals so her children love to have vegetables in their meal.

The Multilayer Kitchen garden also contributed in improving the livelihood of Chandrawati's family as the sale of surplus vegetables provided her cash income of around Rs. 15000 in a year.



Water, Sanitation & Hygiene (WASH) Program

A WASH initiative was implemented to test out WASH product and service models in 10 Gram Panchayats of Shivrajpur Block in Kanpur Nagar, Uttar Pradesh to generate and capture evidence for learning and scale up.

A qualitative in-depth study was carried out in three Kanpur Nagar (Uttar Pradesh) to understand the existing status of WASH financing, with the following specific objectives:

- Conduct WASH Gap Analysis in the target areas to identify existing status, key challenges and constraints with respect to WASH behaviour and services
- Assess the availability, accessibility and affordability of WASH related products and services
- Prepare profile of SHGs functional in the area

The communities identified for the study were those with critical WASH related gaps and hence need interventions that can support them in improving WASH facilities.

lower level of awareness and sensitization on WASH issues, availability and usage of IHHL. Primarily due to faulty designs, Contamination of Drinking Water, non-availability of drainage and waste disposal system at the community level emerged as key challenges during the study.

The study provided an insight that in order to bring about behaviour change and improve the adoption of WASH practices, it is critical to ensure that the required products and materials are easily available and are affordable as well. Therefore, an intervention to support local traders and micro-enterprise to stock these materials can resolve these challenges.

The study also revealed that there are no Water purification plant, septic tank cleaning facility, or solid waste composting facility available in any of the 10 GPs. Hence there is scope of setting up WASH enterprises in this space.



Our Community Health Interventions are helping marginalized communities to experience better quality of life, reduced costs on healthcare leading to increased productivity and improved livelihood

Community Grain Bank

Since 2011, Community Grain Banks have been instrumental in ensuring food security of small and marginal farming communities and landless people in rural Uttar Pradesh.

Presently, 113 grain banks are functional and serving their members by providing them grains during lean period.

The members who borrowed grains from their grain banks returned the grain (soon after harvesting) by adding 25% to it. Thus making Grain Banks self-sustainable.

These grain banks are managed by local women groups.

ONE CAN BANK UPON FOR FOOD DURING CRISIS

Meena W/O Awdhesh is resident of village Chhabhaniwada, a small hamlet in Shiurajpur Block of Kanpur Nagar district in Uttar Pradesh. Her family owns 1.5 beegha (around 0.9 Acre) agriculture land where she is doing natural farming to grow safe and nutritious food for her family consumption. There are seven members in Meena's family and every year there are few months in a year when the stored grain at Meena's house gets finished and she faces shortage of food grain to feed her family as the agriproduce from her small farm does not suffice the feeding needs of the Meena's family. Her husband Awdhesh work as labour to earn additional income for their livelihood.

Meena is member of a Self Help Group in her village (promoted by Shramik Bharti) and in the year 2017, the group set up a Community Grain Bank "Jai Ganga Maiya Anaaj Bank" in the village to provide Grains to their members during lean period. Since then she borrowed 200 Kg. wheat every year (4 times since the formation of grain bank) when there is shortage of grain in her family. Every time she returned the grain (after the harvesting) by adding 25% to it, to its grain bank. Thus ensuring the sustainability of grain bank.

"Now I don't need to take debt from money lenders for purchasing grain from the market at higher price. Nor I need to work just as bonded labour on the farms of big farmers in return to the grains I used to borrow from them before the formation of our grain bank. "My grain bank is my pride" tells Meena with twinkling eyes.



In nutshell, the community grain banks are providing food to needy farming families when they need it most at the same time these are protecting farmers from the clutches of big land owners and gombeen-man who used to exploit them by providing loans on high rate of interest

HIV Prevention Program among IDUs

Shramik Bharti is implementing a program among Injectable Drug Users (IDUs) in Kanpur Nagar with the objective of reducing the risk of HIV transmission among injectable drug users and improve their overall health outcomes.

The program focused on 765 registered IDUs and provided care, education, guidance and support to reduce injection drug use and associated risks.

Mega health check up camps and Women Health Check up camps were organized on the occasion of International Women's Day. Awareness sessions on HIV medication and testing workshops were conducted. Workshop with LGBTQ Community was organized.

Awareness programs on HIV prevention were broadcasted on community radio "Waqt Ki Awaaz" promoted by Shramik Bharti.

The IDUs families were badly hit during COVID 19 as most of these families belong to daily wage laborer, domestic help etc. So they were supported with ration kits for 3 months to ensure their food security. 1000 Hygiene Kits and N95 Masks were provided to HRGs for ensuring COVID Appropriate Behavior.

4 High Risk Group's families were provided cash support to restore their livelihood post pandemic.



Strengthening Government Schools for Quality Education

The education of children suffered badly due to COVID 19 and subsequent lockdowns. However the education volunteers continued to support children in studies in villages of Punjab and Uttar Pradesh.

Information and awareness about COVID appropriate behavior was disseminated by education volunteers in their local communities and among children.

Education consultant visited schools to understand the needs of schools in terms of TLM, Library books etc. Volunteers were trained regularly on play-way learning methods.

A girls' education initiative started post first wave of COVID 19 with the intent of keeping as many girls in schools as possible, now became a regular program in a short span on one year.



13 Girls were supported for studies and Professional/Vocational Trainings this year

Soumya

AN INSPIRING JOURNEY FROM SUFFERER TO HEALER

Soumya, a 20 year old girl from Kanpur Nagar, Uttar Pradesh lost her father when she was just 12 years old. Her mother worked as domestic help to support the family of three; Soumya, her younger brother and herself. Unfortunately she suffered from cancer and died in the year 2020.

Now there were only Soumya and her 14 year old brother left in the family to take care of each other. Soumya anyhow managed to study up to class 12th under such circumstances. After the demise of mother, Soumya's brother dropped out and started working as delivery boy in a grocery shop.

Soumya had a strong desire to study further for the better future of herself and her brother. When we met her, she expressed desire to pursue a career in nursing.

This was the time when idea of Khilti Kaliyan was kick starting post pandemic (first wave). Due to lack of sufficient resources(for nursing course) we initially tried to engage Soumya in learning basic computer skills (just to keep her motivated).

All good deeds find their ways. We were able to fetch the support for enrolling Soumya for B.Sc. (Nursing). She is studying nursing to give healing touch to the patients with utmost care and empathy.
